Sketch of the Proceedings of the House of Representatives.

TRENTON, Oct. 24, 1820.

This being the time and place appointed by law for the meeting of the Legislature, the following persons, to wit—Bergen, Seba Brinkerhoff, and Charles Board—Essex, Samuel Pennington, Samuel B. Miller, Stephen D. Day, and John Dow—Morris, David Thompson, jun., William Munro, Silas Cook, and Benjamin Smith—Sussex, John Horabek, Abraham Shaver, Peter Kline, and Joseph Coryell—Hunterdon, Israel Taylor, Abraham Stout, Thomas Capner, and George Maxwell—Somerset, Dickerson Miller, Jacob Kline, and John H. Disborough—Middlesex, Ercuries Beatty, and James Cook—Monmouth, Thomas Cox, Matthias Van Brakle, and Samuel F. Allen—Burlington, Thomas Newbold, Geo. Hulme, Gershom Mott, William Stockton, jun.—Gloucester, Jehu Wilson, William Tatem, John M. White—Salem, Morris Hancock, Zacheus Ray, and John G. Mason—Cumberland, William B. Ewing, Nathan Leake, and L. Q. C. Elmer—Cape-May, Joshua Townsend—appeared, produced certificates of their election, and took their seats.

The members proceeded to the choice of a speaker, when David Thompson, jun. esq. was unanimously chosen. Daniel Coleman, esq. was unanimously appointed clerk.

William Gould was appointed door keeper.

A message from Council informed the House that Council had chosen the hon. Jesse Upson, Vice-President, and James Linn, esq. the Secretary.

Committees appointed—Messrs. Dow, Newbold and Hancock to prepare rules and regulations. Messrs. S. B. Milles, S. Cook, and Ewing to bring forward unfinished business—Adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, Oct. 25.

Cornelius Van Winkle as a representative from Bergen, appeared, was qualified and took his seat.

Mr. Dow, from committee, reported rules and regulations for the government of the House, which were agreed to and ordered to be printed for the use of the members.

Mr. Miller, from committee, reported the following list of unfinished business, viz:

- No. 1. A bill to prevent creditors from imprisoning debtors by executions against their bodies, except in certain cases.
2. A bill directing the manner of selecting jurors...
3. A bill to provide for the voluntary dissolution of bank incorporations.
4. A bill to increase the number of representatives of the county of Gloucester, in the General Assembly.
5. A bill to divorce Jane Sweezy from her husband Stephen Sweezy.
6. A bill to incorporate the Phoenix Insurance Company at Elizabeth-Town.
7. A bill respecting usury.
8. A bill to suspend the sentence of death in certain cases, until after the meeting of the Governor and Council.
9. A petition from the county of Essex for setting off a new township.
10. A petition from William Jackson for the manumission of his slave.
11. A memorial from a committee of Princeton College.

Which report was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Taylor presented a communication for C. Ewing and S. L. Southard, esqs. relative to the new edition of the public laws, which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Pennington offered the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas from causes not within our control, the agricultural, manufacturing and commercial interests of the country have undergone within these two years past a serious depression—Few have been exempt from its embarrassing effects. This branch of the government, upon whom devolves more immediately the pecuniary concerns of the state, have in view to limit the annual state expenditures—that a due regard be had to the scarcity and value of our currency—that the existing pressure of the times be more equal in its operation,

Resolved, That a committee be appointed whose duty it shall be to examine as to the expediency of an adjourned sitting, the reduction of wages and diminishing of salaries, and such other measures, as will tend to a retrenchment in the financial expenditures of the state—and report by bill or otherwise.

Read, agreed to, and Messrs. Pennington, Newbold and J. Kline, accordingly appointed.

Committees appointed.—Messrs Taylor, Elmer and S. Miller, to bring in a bill for the support of government.

Messrs. Leake, Day and Monro to bring in an incidental bill.

Messrs. Beatty, Stout and Cox to bring

in a tax bill. Messrs. Newbold, Taylor, Dow, D. Miller and S. Cook to settle the Treasurer's accounts.

Messrs. Ewing, Capner, Smith, Coryell and White to settle the accounts of the state prison.

The House took up No. 2 of unfinished business, a bill directing the manner of selecting jurors, which being read was ordered a second reading, and to be printed.

No. 7. of unfinished business, a bill respecting usury, was read and dismissed.

No. 1. A bill to prevent creditors from imprisoning debtors in the jails of this state, by executions against their bodies, except in certain cases, was read and ordered to lie on the table.

No. 3. was postponed. No. 4 and 5, read, and ordered a second reading.

No. 6. read and referred to Messrs. S. Miller and Ray. No. 7 was dismissed.

No. 8. read and postponed. Mr. Ewing offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Clerk inform Council that this House is ready to go into Joint meeting for the purpose of choosing a Governor, Secretary, Treasurer, and other civil and military officers as may be deemed expedient and necessary, and request Council to appoint the time and place of said meeting.

A message from Council informed that Council have appointed Messrs. Stryker and Newbold, or either of them a committee for settling the accounts of the State Prison—and Messrs. Kirkpatrick and Rutherford, or either of them a committee for the purpose of settling the Treasurer's accounts. Adjourned.

Three o'clock the House met. Isaac Hance, as a representative from the county of Monmouth appeared, was qualified and took his seat.

Petitions presented; From Henry Kingsland of Bergen county owner in part of certain salt marsh in said county, complaining of certain acts of the Legislature and praying relief in the premises—also a counter petition from Jacob Van Winkle, owner in part of the aforesaid meadows—From Ruth Wood, relict of James Wood late of Gloucester county, deceased, and others praying for an act to authorize the sale of real estate—From William W. Stockton of Burlington county, praying for an act to authorize Joseph Earl, esq. executor of Samuel Earl deceased to fulfil a certain contract. &c. which petitions were severally read and committed.

Mr. Dow, with leave, presented a bill entitled An act relative to commissioners for taking the acknowledgement and proof of deeds and conveyances—Read, and ordered a second reading.

Mr. Elmer, offered the following resolution:

Read, agreed to, and Messrs. Elmer, Board and Allen, accordingly appointed. Adjourned.

THURSDAY, October 26.

Ten o'clock—the House met. Petitions presented—From a number of aliens residing in this state praying exemption from militia duty—from inhabitants of Salem county, owners and possessors of a large body of tide meadow, praying for a law to authorize the embankment of the same—read and committed.

A message from Council, informed that Council will go into Joint-Meeting in the Assembly Room, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of Friday next, for the purpose of choosing a Governor, Secretary, and such other civil officers as may be deemed expedient and necessary, a Treasurer, of this state, and a Senator from this state to the Congress of the U. States excepted—whereupon the House agreed to the exception of the appointment of a Treasurer, and disagreed to the now appointment of a Senator.

Mr. Pennington, from the committee to whom was referred a preamble and a resolution offered by himself yesterday—reported,

That so far as their duty extends relative to an adjourned sitting, and taking into consideration the time spent and labor bestowed by the last Legislature in reviewing and revising the public laws of this state, it is presumed that less time of the Legislature will be required on that subject than usual, and that an early avowal of the intention of the Legislature unfavorable to an adjourned sitting will ensure the coming in of all important private business, that it may be disposed of within a limited time, not calling for the trouble and expense of an adjourned sitting—

Resolved, That this branch of the Legislature deem it inexpedient to have an adjourned sitting.

Which report was read and the resolution ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. White, from the committee of conference on the subject of the Joint-Meeting, reported in favor of receding from the disagreement of the House to the amendment made by Council to the message, which report was agreed to and the Clerk ordered to inform Council accordingly.—Adj'd.

FRIDAY Oct. 27.

Ten o'clock the House met.

Mr. J. T. M'Dowell, as a representative from the county of Middlesex, appeared, was qualified, and took his seat.

A Vincennes (Indiana) paper of Sept. 12, states that the situation of that place was truly deplorable.
