On motion of Mr. Storrs it has been Resolved, That the Secretary of the Treasury be directed to communicate to this house the amount of moneys drawn from the Treasury of the United States by the War and Navy Departments respectively, from the 30th day of November, last; designating the amount drawn under each respective appropriation, together with an account of any transfers which may have been made at the Treasury, during the late recess of Congress, from one appropriation to another; and, also, the aggregate amount of payments made during the same period, by the Treasurer of the United States, as agent of the War and Navy Departments respectively, on warrants drawn by said Departments on the Treasurer as such agent, designating the amount of payments made under each head of appropriation respectively, during the same period.

The following resolution has been adopted on motion of Mr. Cook:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Treasury be directed to lay before this house a statement of the number of claims to military bounty land, for services rendered during the late war, which remain unsatisfied; the aggregate amount of acres necessary to satisfy those claims; and the time when the lands will be ready to be distributed amongst the respective claimants.

A bill to incorporate the managers of the National Vaccine Institution, has been ordered to be engrossed, for a third reading to the House of Representatives.

The Resolution for the admission of Missouri, has not been called for in either House."

SUMMARY.

Meeting of the Electors.—The Electors of this State, of President and Vice-President, will meet at the State-House in Trenton, on Wednesday, the 6th inst. at 10 o'clock A. M.

Gen. Ripley.—The report of the death of a distinguished officer at New-Orleans, contradicted in the southern papers.

New York Legislature.—A bill has passed both Houses, and become a law, for final settlement of the long-disputed accounts of the Vice-President with the State of New York. By the provisions of the law both parties are exonerated from all claims on the other. The bill met with opposition in both Houses—but eventually passed the Senate 19 to 11—and the Assembly 69 to 54.

Flour was selling at Alexandria on Saturday week, for three dollars and twenty cents per barrel from the wagons. It was not so low in that part of the country for the last twenty years.

Letters from Port au Prince of the 1st inst. state that all the people of the North submitted to the Republic, and but one government existed. President Boyer had arrived at the Cape.

We understand that the state Bank of North Carolina, and all its branches, had commenced paying specie for their respective notes.

A private letter from Louisville, Kentucky, states, that a slight shock of an earthquake was felt there on the 9th November, about sunset.

The harvest in America as well as in Europe, has been throughout very abundant. A letter from Carlow, Ireland, contains the following remarkable sentence: "Our country is now groaning under the weight of God's goodness to us—the grain is so abundant, it is generally believed that there will not be money enough to purchase half of it, nor storage to contain it."

The celebrated Bonnet, made at Wethersfield, (Conn.) was sold at auction in New York a few days ago, for THIRTY-NINE dollars.

The New-Haven Journal says, the loss sustained by the late fire in that City, does not exceed 63,000 dollars.

The Legislature of the State of New York closed their extra session on Tuesday evening previous to adjournment; the bill calling for a revision to revise the Constitution of this State, which had passed both Houses in the casting vote of the Governor.

The exports of domestic produce and manufactures, from New-Orleans, the last year, are estimated at \$71,735,433.

On the 14th ult. a young man put an end to his life in Albany, by taking 4 oz. of laudanum. The cause of committing this horrid act is said to be disappointment in love.

The Bourns, of Vermont, have petitioned the legislature of that state, for pecuniary relief, on account of suffering occasioned by a prosecution for the supposed murder of Russell Colvin, who "once was dead, but is alive again." Instead of relief they obtained leave to withdraw their petition.

Longevity.—Communed with the church at North-Guillerd, on the 25th of October, 1820, two brothers and three sisters, whose ages added together, make four hundred and eighteen years; and what is yet more singular, the brothers are widowers, and the sisters widows.

Agricultural Almanac.—A work bearing this title, and published under the patronage of the Board of Agriculture of New-York, has just appeared at Albany. It owes its origin to the very intelligent Secretary to the Board, Solomon Southwick, Editor of that valuable and interesting work, entitled the Plough Boy.

A Plough has been invented for tilling rough land, called the rid plough. It prevents the plough from getting choaked up before and behind the coulter, and in the point of the irons, with straw, yard dung, or rough stubble in wet weather, and will go as clear through a field of full grown grain as on a smooth sea, and nothing will stop it save stock and stones.

An Irish painter declares in an Irish Journal, that among other portraits, he has a representation of death as large as life.

The booksellers of Paris are publishing a collection of the best Memoirs relating to the French Revolution. The collection will comprise a great number of volumes.

The Schoharie Repshlian contains an account of a suicide committed by an old man of seventy, who hung himself in despair, at the loss of property, owing to the failure of his sons, for whom he had become security.

Among the singularities attending the Queen's trial, is the disposal of the witnesses. After they had given their testimony, they were put on board a vessel and hurried away to the continent.—Some of them have been threatened with prosecution for perjury by the Queen's Counsel, but they have been placed out of the reach of justice by the ministry.

Suicide.—Last Monday morning, John Price, of Newton, Sussex co. put a period to his life, by cutting his throat.

The Journeymen Printers in London have voted to present an address to the Queen, condoling with her on the persecution to which she is exposed: to be printed on satin.

The Emperor of Russia has opened the Polish Diet with a speech, in which he puts an end to all their hopes, if they entertained any, of being restored to their independence as a kingdom.
